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PRECONFERENCE SESSION: TEACHING WRITING WITH LOCAL HISTORY

Located in Pristina, Thursday, 2/24, 9:00-11:00am

To learn to write, you need something to say and to care about the music of expression. Perhaps no one learns the history of the place they call home without feeling its deep relevance in their own life and the way that relevance transcends locality. Bringing together these forces of motivation, then, can give new writers both a surprising pool of content and impetus to shape and tell it. Indeed, "Teaching Writing with Local History" can surprise students into finding they care about either, and indeed both. Those who know how to scratch the surface of history know the history of any place yields surprises. Discovering that fact is exciting and can lead students to the natural desire to tell the stories they find. The desire to tell a story, furthermore, necessitates the desire to tell it well.

For more than a century, Jacksonville has stood out nationally for its murder rates. Headlines call the city "Florida's Murder Capital." The eight stories in Tim Gilmore's 20th book tell of Cuban Revolutionaries, of little-known serial killers and a phony serial killer, of a man who courted and murdered mother-daughter pairs, of lynchings and the grossest Southern good-ole-boy corruption, of "Satanic Panic," of a white supremacist killer with a black male lover. These stories each stand on their own, even as they interrogate the long violent history of Florida, the Deep South, and the city where those two entities most thoroughly intersect.

PRECONFERENCE Speaker Dr. Tim Gilmore

Dr. Tim Gilmore is the author of 18 books including *Repossessions: Mass Shooting in Baymeadows* (2019), *Goat Island Hermit: The State of Florida versus Rollians Christopher* (2018), *Devil in the Baptist Church: Bob Gray's Unholy Trinity* (2016), *The Mad Atlas of Virginia King* (2015), *In Search of Eartha White, Storehouse for the People* (2014), and *Stalking Ottis Toole: A Southern Gothic*. Gilmore is the founder of the annual JaxbyJax Literary Arts Festival (www.jaxbyjax.com) in Jacksonville, Florida and creator of Jax Psycho Geo (www.jaxpsychogeo.com), a collection of *close to 500 stories about locations around Northeast Florida. Gilmore teaches Literature and Writing at Florida State College at Jacksonville, where he was awarded a 2018 Distinguished Faculty Award. The Cultural Council of Greater*



Jacksonville named Gilmore the 2018 Literary Artist of the Year. Also, in 2018. Gilmore served on the Jacksonville Citv Council's Civil **Rights History** Task Force. He holds a Ph.D. in English from the University of Florida.

The gregory cowan memorial award for excellence in the teaching of english

The Gregory Cowan Memorial Award for Excellence in the Teaching of English was established by Elizabeth Cowan in 1980 in memory of her husband, Greg Cowan, who died in 1979. An enthusiastic supporter of community colleges, Greg was the Chair of the National Community College Committee, instrumental in founding the regional organizations, an active member of CCCC and NCTE, and the author of six textbooks. First awarded in 1981, the Cowan Award celebrates excellence in teaching and is determined by the TYCA-SE State Representatives after the nomination process is completed. It is the premier award given by TYCA-SE. As such, the Cowan Award recipient is honored in several ways at the annual conference: with a special session in which he or she gives a presentation to the members, with waived registration fees, with a \$1000 stipend, with a commemorative plaque, and with a reception following the presentation.



KEYNOTE Speaker: Tim dorsey



Tim Dorsey (Virtual Appearance)

is the New York Times bestselling author of the Serge Storms series. He was born in Indiana, moved to Florida at the age of 1, and grew up in a small town about an hour north of Miami called Riviera Beach. He graduated from Auburn University in 1983 with a B.S. in Transportation. While at Auburn, he was editor of the student newspaper, *The Plainsman*. Before becoming a full-time writer in 1999, he was a police and courts reporter for the *Alabama Journal* from 1983 to 1987 and a night

metro editor for the *Tampa Tribune* from 1994 to 1999. *The Providence Journal* has called him "the undisputed king of the comic crime novel." At the center of Dorsey's crime fiction series is Serge Storms, a wanted serial killer whose love of life and all things Florida is rivaled only by his propensity for creatively punishing every egomaniac, sadistic animal abuser or black-hearted career criminal he encounters. Session I

Solaria A

UTILIZING TECHNOLOGY TO BENEFIT A DIVERSE STUDENT POPULATION

Amber Harrison Mabus, Holmes Community College

The 21st century college composition classroom hosts a student population that is more diverse than ever and includes traditional, non-traditional, and dually-enrolled students. It is not uncommon for students from ages fourteen to forty to be enrolled in the same class. In addition to the apparent differences in maturity, students also come from a wide range of diverse backgrounds and ethnicities with varied learning experiences. Accommodating such a diverse population can be difficult for even the most experienced instructor. Thankfully, just as the classroom population has evolved, so has classroom technology. Utilization of Learning Management Systems and other online learning tools can improve classroom organization, student engagement, and student accountability.

Solaria B SURVIVAL IN THE ZOMBIE APOCALYPSE

Suzanne Hess, Florida State College at Jacksonville (FL)

Publishers, the new bookstore requirements, and e-Learning have clouded the process of getting English instructors at the six campuses of Hinds Community College to accept a change which may soon become moot because of rapid advances in technology. We will explore what can be done when divergent humans agree on the impossible--and the process blocks them.

BURN IT DOWN? HOPE AND INNOVATION FOR THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE WRITING CLASSROOM IN THE AGE OF WHITE SUPREMACY

Indigo Eriksen, Northern Virginia Community College (VA)

"Language is a place of struggle" writes bell hooks (2004, p. 153). Gloria Anzaldúa (1987) describes learning to write in the US school system as "linguistic terrorism" (pp. 80-81). Geneva Smitherman (1999), Vershawn Ashanti Young (2010; 2013), and Asao Inoue (2012, 2019) argue College Composition upholds oppression through its reliance on a single (white) standard of academic writing. It is troubling that critiques of inequity have plagued writing studies for over six decades, a problem Inoue emphasized in his 2019 CCCC address, which argued that college writing faculty, through the ways we judge language, reinforce white language supremacy.

This presentation explores findings of an empirical feminist ethnographic pilot study of an English department at a large, mid-Atlantic community college. As an ethnography and an intervention, this study examined what if (Blair and Nickoson, 2018) a community of writing faculty examines their pedagogies from an anti-racist perspective? What happens if a community of writing faculty examine the racist history of their field? What stories, ideas, conflicts, conjunctures, and disjunctures arise if a social-justice oriented community of majority white writing faculty reflect on their experiences teaching writing to historically marginalized students?

Solaria B POETRY PARACHUTES: ASSIGNMENTS AS JUMPING-OFF POINTS

Amy Baskin, Florida State College at Jacksonville (FL)

Agency, confidence and risk-taking are requirements for mastery in writing. Many students face barriers of feeling insecure or holding themselves to lofty standards of perfectionism. Educators can help students turn down the volume on self-criticism and brighten their notions of possibility with low-stakes poetry exercises.

Properly scaffolded and sequenced assignments not only improve student work but increase equity in education. By creating assignments that increase opportunities for feedback and focus on process as well as end product, instructors can increase success - especially for at risk students.

In this hands-on workshop, I'll demonstrate how to transform your favorite writing prompts into scaffolded assignments and share techniques for providing feedback more efficiently. We will discuss why scaffolded assignments promote equity and how to manage them with your busy course load in both face to face and online classes. I'll introduce a writing tool that has been successful in my own courses, and participants will be invited to share any tech tools that work well in their classes. MAID: HOW A NETFLIX SERIES BECAME MY MOST PRO-FOUND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EXPERIENCE

Kim Russell, West Kentucky Community and Technical College (KY)

In 2021, Netflix released Maid, a wildly popular drama that chronicles the daily struggles of a single mother simply trying to create a better future for herself and her daughter. It is a story we, as community college faculty, see every day. The Community College Research Center reports that 37% of community college students came from families earning less than \$20,000 per year. In 2008 Vincent Tinto noted that only 7% of low income students who start at a public two-year college earned a bachelors degree within six years, compared to 26% of higher income students. The community college sector prides itself on being accessible to all. As Tinto states, though, colleges are not doing enough by only providing "access" to higher education if we also "do not construct environments that effectively support their [low income students] efforts to learn and succeed once access has been gained...access without effective support is not opportunity." To provide our students with effective support and create the kind of environment that will promote their success, we must have a clear understanding of their backgrounds, circumstances, and challenges. This session will allow participants to share observations, experiences, and strategies related to serving socioeconomically disadvantaged students.

EXPLAIN LIKE I'M FIVE: A DEFINITION ACTIVITY

Tom Geary, Tidewater Community College (VA)

At the heart of any good research essay, report, or instructions are clear, concise definitions. Definitions simplify complex terms, guide the reader, and establish the core of an argument. In this lightning talk, I will share a definition activity that I use in my technical writing and composition classes to teach audience, diction, concision, and source usage.

In my ELI5 (Explain Like I'm Five) definition assignment, students

write two paragraphs. The fist is an extended, technical definition of a complex term like quasar, torque, or imaginary numbers. Paraphrasing and citing research as needed, writers build from a formal sentence to further explanation utilizing various modes of composition like description, process, and historical background (McMurrey). Then, they "translate" that same definition for non-specialists, shaping their ELI5 paragraph with enough clarity and simplicity that a five-year old could understand the concept.

Inspired by the popular Reddit online community "Explain Like I'm Five," this activity is not only fun and engaging but adaptable to many different courses. There are many samples posted each day, and students can practice their ELI5 skills by posting responses to actual posts on the social network.

INVESTING IN THE FUTURE OF OUR PROFESSION: 5 YEARS OF POST-MASTER'S FELLOWS

Joel B. Henderson, Chattanooga State Community College (TN), and B. Cole Bennett, Abilene Christian University (TX)

Recent graduates of MA programs regularly face the same roadblocks. They often need experience to land a full-time job, but they can't gain said experience without entering the professional limbo of adjunct instruction. If they decide to pursue a terminal degree instead of full-time employment, the increasingly competitive nature of doctoral program funding favors those with practical classroom instructional experience.

In 2016, two longtime colleagues at two very different institutions of higher ed hatched a plan to provide these new graduates with an invaluable year of full-time community college teaching experience. Over the last five years, the Post-Master's Fellowship (PMF) program at Chattanooga State Community College has awarded a non-renewable, one-year, full-time visiting instructor position to five different newly-minted MAs. The recipients have encountered unique challenges and reached different conclusions about their future career aspirations.

Join Joel B. Henderson and B. Cole Bennett for an engaging discussion of the PMF's origins, the steps to program implementation, and lessons learned from the program's veterans about this successful and ongoing professional development program.

Solaria A I GOOGLED MY SYMPTOMS; THE DIAGNOSIS: SENIORITIS-**ENGAGING DUAL-ENROLLED HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS IN** COMPOSITION

Autumn Keeling, Florida Gateway College (FL)

As college campuses across the country recognize the increasingly diverse age range of their students, professors should consider the non-traditional learning needs of these "non-traditional" students. Since composition professors emphasize the importance of the rhetorical situation, they, too, should practice the art of knowing their audiences in order to empower them to find early success in the two-year college setting. In the dual enrollment setting, this means engaging already-apathetic teenaged students, and occasionally ESE students with active IEPs and 504 plans in their high school classes. In order to engage reluctant or struggling writers, dual enrollment professors benefit from making curricular changes that capitalize on topics their students already find interesting and relevant, as well as revising curricula to reflect Universal Design for Learning Guidelines (including effectively using technology in the course and minimizing educational roadblocks for ESE students). Professors may then implement hands-on and collaborative activities that extend beyond the traditional peer review. These curricular shifts prompt mindset shifts from "is it collegiate enough?" to "does data suggest they are learning?"

Solaria B THE RADICAL NOTION OF WHY OUR STUDENTS ARE CONSUMERS

Sean Glassberg, Horry Georgetown Technical College (SC)

Those of us who can remember Pong, dial tones, and a world without Fox News, attended college with different experiences and expectations than what currently inhabits our classrooms. Attend this session to gain a perspective about how and why current college students might view their education and educators similar to how they think of the services and services providers with which they interact on a regular basis.

Pristina THE ONGOING QUEST TO FIND THE BEST EPORTFOLIO PLATFORM FOR EACH CLASSROOM

This session will focus on the HIPS strategy of employing ePortfolios in the individual classroom through an examination of the advantages and disadvantages of different ePortfolio platforms—including the D2L/Brightspace ePortfolio, LinkedIn, WordPress, and Journo Portfolio. We will take a brief look at student work within these various formats, the successes and failures we've encountered with each platform, and some concerns when matching the platform to the overall goals of a particular course.

Hyflex: Incorporating Technology into the Face to Face Classroom

The year 2020 has brought changes in the way face-to-face classes operate. Specifically, lost instruction time for this modality due to quarantine has resulted in lost learning and less ability to scaffold lessons. As a result of these challenges, many instructors have adopted a hyflex model of teaching, which includes allowing students the flexibility to go to class face-to-face when they are feeling well and attending class virtually if they are sick. This modality also allows increased flexibility for the instructor to implement a flipped classroom model. The presenter will discuss her own experiences with the hyflex model, as well as provide some ideas and guidelines for hyflex. This roundtable will include a handout for best practices in hyflex teaching in English composition courses as well as a review of some of the current literature on the hyflex model of teaching. The presenter will also emphasize assisting first generation college students with navigating the hyflex model, particularly freshmen in English composition.

REACHING UNDERSERVED STUDENTS THROUGH MULTIMODAL ASSESSMENT

Taylor Ireland, Hawkes Learning

Many incoming students need to hone their reading and writing skills and be taught the technological skills necessitated by the career landscape's digital revolution. However, if they are not engaged with the lesson content, students will not be motivated to learn. Therefore, digital platforms and conversational, modern-day texts that provide contemporary examples, customized writing assignments, and opportunities to strengthen students' technological savvy & communication skills should be considered, especially in the age of distance learning.

In this presentation, attendees will learn about materials that provide relevant applications, examples and multimodal assessments to motivate students and keep them engaged throughout the course. Focus students' attention on skills with pre-created diagnostic tests for an individualized student experience in the composition classroom. Assignments providing relevant examples and connections to students' professional, academic, and everyday lives will also be shown.

Detailed performance reporting and analytics that allow instructors to keep a finger on the pulse of their classrooms will be shared. The presenter will show reports that identify at-risk students and key intervention points for those who are struggling, as well as a tool that provides both a big-picture overview of class performance as well as an in-depth look at performance on a per-student and per-question basis.

SAVING THE SURVEY: A DISCUSSION OF HOW TCTC INCLUDED THEMATIC FOCUS IN OUR LITERATURE SURVEYS

Tri-County's English department has undertaken revising our literature surveys in a multi-year approach. We will share our process in renewing our surveys to address the 21st Century skills our students need as well as meeting the changes four-year institutions conducted to their two hundred level literature courses. Through our departmental discussions, we determined that our courses should follow a thematic structure without changing the course outcomes. Pilot courses for American Literature 2 and British Literature 2 were approved to begin in Spring 2022.

Our presentation will delve into our process for determining thematic structures, the specifics for the pilot classes by the current professors, group projects addressing 21st Century Skills, and the importance of transfer skill-based assignments.

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
